Trevor Langley recalls some of the highs and lows of his tenure

My, how time flies when you are having fun! My three year tenure as your President has flown by so, for my last piece for Touchline, I will indulge myself by looking back to the high, and low, lights of this period.

Let's start on a positive note: I've seen a lot of good rugby played, both at the Mote and on a number of opposition grounds, and I know that a large number of people, of all ages, have enjoyed themselves in the process. Being the President of the one of the oldest clubs in Kent, and the UK, is a position to be proud of but the sight of all the senior and junior players going about their business as part of the club is what underpins my pleasure.

I know that we've been relegated this season and that could have made it depressing, but I have been impressed by the refusal of the 1st team to accept the inevitable and to fight to the bitter end. Rugby is a team game and we have not played well enough as a team to dominate our opposition but I'm confident that we have the players with the right commitment and skills to, not only, start winning again but get us back into London 1 (South). Improving our team play is the ingredient to concentrate on but, once we find it, we'll be back.

What has also impressed me is the willingness of club members to step up and play at higher levels when required. You have to be fully committed to the Club to turn out regularly when in the veteran category: without naming individuals, well done, all of you!

Getting some new training lights in place within the last few weeks is a definite positive for the club. I take no credit for this – Andy Golding has been the driving force – but the contributions of the Vice-Presidents to the costs have helped. We are still not quite at our goal, so anyone who would like to contribute, please send me a cheque. It is never too late!

Our major off-field problem, this year, has been the accident to the Gravesend player, Clarence Harding, who lost the sight in one eye as a result of an incident when playing against us in January. This is still unresolved but everyone from our club, who has been close to it, is convinced it was a terrible accident, despite the attempts of the media to paint it as a deliberate eye gouge. Incidents like this show the strengths and weaknesses of organisations and I am proud to say that our Chairman has shown her immense value to the club. Not only has she held firm to a set of strategies, defined at the outset to help cope with the fall-out, but she has put in hours of work co-ordinating with the police, the RFU, Kent RFU and club members. She and the committee deserve the thanks of everyone.

The major disappointment during my tenure has been the failure to form the Mote Sports Foundation with the other clubs on the site. I had certainly hoped to drive this to a positive conclusion by now, and I will continue trying, but the glacially slow progress has left me frustrated.

Let me finally, in parting, thank everyone for making Maidstone Football Club a wonderful place to spend my spare time: to those who take on responsible roles as Committee members; coaches who strive manfully to improve the play of our teams; Vice-Presidents who support the club in a multitude of ways and club members in general, particularly those who are happy to wear the new club blazer and make a true statement of their commitment to the cause! Thanks to you all.

And now over to Bob Beney, your President designate: let's continue to make Maidstone a welcoming club for members and visitors both; to provide the opportunity to play rugby for everyone in the town and to develop our young members to the highest level we can. TL

The Chairman's Message

A positive note from Wendy Pound

This is my final Touchline message after four years in this role and it gives me an opportunity to reflect on the past year. A number of times in recent months I have heard the phrase *annus horribilis*. In fact I prefer to think of it as *annus mirabilis* for there has been much to celebrate.

The season began with the U9s winning the Plate at the Medway Festival. The U17s won the Jack Conn Cup at Chingford and ended their season as runners-up in the Kent Cup as well as conquering the Irish on their home turf during their end of season tour. The U10s and U12s both finished the season with two trophies each from the Beccehamians and Aylesford Festivals.

Thanks to the efforts of a great team of coaches, the Tag Section has sought out new sponsors and increased its numbers. In addition it is giving the under 6s the opportunity to experience tag rugby at an early age. The growing numbers in the youth section are encouraging.

Coaches are keen to develop their knowledge and skills and we had a large number attending the Rugby First Course which Maidstone hosted. This course is a pre-requisite for those applying for Level 1 training which many have now done.

We also had coaches from each age group and the senior section attending a Child Safeguarding course which Maidstone hosted. Representatives from those teams who did not have their own first-aider also attended the First Aid course at the club.

The club continued its links with the community and local schools by providing a venue for the RDO to develop new rugby coaches. Interschool competitions for local senior schools were held over three weeks at the club and once again Maidstone hosted the Primary Schools Tag Festival.

At senior level, Andy Foley has now been appointed as Head Coach. Andy comes to Maidstone with a good track record and is looking forward to the coming season and the opportunities this will bring.

In September 2009 the new look club website was launched which, thanks to the sterling efforts of a number of people, is informative and current and a credit to those who work tirelessly to ensure that it remains up to date.

Due mainly to the efforts of Andy Golding, the club now has new and vastly improved floodlights enabling greater, and safer, use of the training pitch. Fund raising will now turn towards creating a minis training and playing area on the waste ground at the end of the 1st XV pitch.

Bob Hayton has continued his efforts to develop the number of sponsors supporting Maidstone. In the current economic climate this is a difficult job. The signing of PAR Marketing to assist the club in recruiting sponsors is a step forward.

On the social front there were quiz competitions to be won and the season ended with the traditional ball, held this year at the Village Hotel. Our thanks to Amanda Maddaford for organising this.

The Police enquiry into the incident in the match between Maidstone and Gravesend which resulted in a tragic injury to a Gravesend player concluded that there was insufficient evidence to refer the case to the CPS. An investigation has been carried out by the club and a full report submitted to the RFU who are now conducting their own enquiry. It is expected that this will be concluded by the end of July.

At the time of writing the first draft of the club's portfolio of evidence for the Whole Club Seal of Approval has been approved by the RFU and work on the final stages is now in hand.

The end of this season also sees the end of Trevor Langley's term of office as President. Trevor has supported the club over many years and has given much to the role during the last three years. Trevor will continue in his role as liaison officer for the proposed development at the Mote.

Before I finally 'hang up my boots' I have many people to thank for their hard work and support both for me and the club; in particular those on the Committee: Bob Hayton, Andy Golding, Dave Coleman, Tom Challis, Trevor Langley, Richard Ewence, Tracey Wakefield, Brian McKeon, Alan Hayward and Darren Mitchell. There are many others without whom the club could not function, chief among them the coaches, physios, bar staff, all players and the parents of those in the youth section and, of course, the club's many loyal supporters. The more people who offer their help and support the easier the task for all those concerned. There is no magic wand to change things overnight, but a willingness to try will make a difference.

Andy Golding Analyses the Season

From a collective-results perspective, as demonstrated by the foregoing statistics, this will not go down as one of the best seasons and yet, paradoxically, we have a club as buoyant and as happy as I can ever remember. From a playing point of view on most occasions we have fielded six senior sides, have a membership in excess of 500 with a burgeoning and successful youth section underpinned by an impressive Tag Rugby section that has mushroomed with numbers predicted to rise to 100 U6-U8 players in only their second season.

On top of that, we have new state-of-the-art floodlights, confirmed conversion of the waste ground at the back of the 1st XV pitch (via self-generated funding) as a mini rugby training facility, as well as being well on our way to achieving the Whole Club Seal of Approval - all of which will re-affirm us as one of the premier clubs in Kent either to join or to play for.

In addition, we have a tremendously loyal player base with players coming from far-a-field to play for the club and some who have been playing members for well over 25 years or more. To exemplify this, in a recent conversation with a 'stalwart 3rd XV and ex 1st XV player, from the National League era, I asked him why he still played for the club despite living in Southend. He quite simply said: "I could easily play for Southend but what can be better than playing rugby with your mates, who you have known for years, at a great club like Maidstone".

To me, whilst results are important, arguably this is what a successful community, amateur rugby club is all about.

FIRST XV - UNCONTROLLABLE FACTORS UNDOUBTEDLY PROVED TO BE KEY

Moving onto individual team performances, *Annus Horribilis* is a much-overused term. However, in the context of the 1st XV, it would seem an apt description. Not exclusively from the playing results alone (although one win and relegation to London 2 speaks for itself) but from a number of other key factors, some controllable, most not, which have undoubtedly impacted on performance.

- We had/have 'gouge-gate, (as it is known), hanging over us like the 'Sword of Damocles', which has created a lot of adverse publicity despite no evidence to show that the incident was anything but an unfortunate accident.
- Experimentation with overseas players, which was a steep learning curve and which, with the exception of Mike Molloy, showed that it takes more than a few overseas players to make a successful team.
- An inability to do the basics well borne from not settling on and being comfortable on a pattern and style of play which suited all.
- An 'epidemic' of hamstring and other injuries, which highlighted that perhaps we were not as fit, physical or battle-hardened, as we needed to be. In fact, I don't remember one game, where we did not suffer an injury that forced a player to leave the field' and there were at least three players, who got injured during the warm-up before they even took the field.
- Level-six rugby, which has gone through the roof in terms of standard and teams boasting many semi-professional and ex-professional players.
- Competing for the same player base as our local rivals Ayelsford.

Against this backdrop, and with only one win to show from the season, most clubs would have undoubtedly lost players and fragmented.

Quitting, however, has never been an option at Maidstone. We can all ride on the crest of a wave when things are going well but, for me, the true measure of success is how we respond to the difficult times. Easier said then done, you might think - but what we do is we take it on the chin, dust ourselves down and work even harder

to achieve our objectives and that is exactly what we have done and are doing. The fact that the 1st XV squad and, for that matter the Mustangs, have stuck together as a team through all the problems we have faced this season pays testament to the players' attitude, commitment and passion to play for this club.

There are a number of players, who have made a significant contribution including out-going captain Mark Ryan, top points-scorer, Mike Molloy, top try-scorer Neil Graves (who with his injury record, ironically had the most starts) and players such as John O'Brien, Josh Pankhurst, Sam Bailey and Matt Iles, who have made a real impact. Others, such as 'evergreens' Dave Tugwell, Mark Thurgood and Martin Maytum, played some of their best rugby and had more 1st XV starts than they probably bargained for. In addition, we recruited some talented new players to compliment our seasoned 'war horses', namely, lan Overton, Craig Webb, Ryan Mills and Lee Thompson, who will no doubt stand us in good stead for our assault on the league this coming year. We also continued to develop our wealth of youth talent with players such as Tim Wetjen, Lewis Fawcett and Jon Broadly, having developed immeasurably from 1st team exposure both in terms of character and ability. To continue our 'home-grown' youth development policy, we have a number of very exciting and talented U17s, who we hope to integrate into senior rugby and who I am sure will get 1st XV squad opportunities this year.

Last but not least, I would also like to formally recognise the contribution made by ex-Head Coach Tim McBennett, who after more than a decade of loyal service to the club decided that it was time to move onto pastures new and I wish him well with his deserved appointment as Canterbury's backs coach.

Time to rebuild in a less-charged environment

In many ways, I am glad that we have been relegated and whilst I am as ambitious as anyone for this club to do well, we need time to re-build in a less charged environment to start winning again, develop confidence and go back to playing rugby with smiles on faces. Whilst I would like nothing more than for the 1st XV to bounce back to London 1 in our first season, my key objective is to make sure that <u>all</u> players are enjoying their rugby and playing to the very best

of their ability. With new Head Coach, Andy Foley at the helm, ably supported by the likes of Shaun Neaves, Fin Davies and Sadie Jones, I am sure that this will all be achieved. To quote:

MUSTANGS - BEARING THE BRUNT OF 1st XV INJURIES - WHILE PLAYING IN A VERY STRONG LEAGUE

THIRD XV - THE ONLY REGULAR TEAM TO HAVE WON MORE GAMES THAN THEY LOST

Having experienced some early difficulties in coming to terms with Invicta League 2 rugby, they adjusted well and are the only regular team in the club to have won more games than they lost. The need to fulfil rearranged fixtures and supply a number of players to the 'Evergreen' cup side, however, meant that they fell away in both league and cup. Yet they still finished a creditable third in their league, having at one point been title contenders. My hope, now they are returning to Invicta 3 rugby, is that those who played so ably in Invicta 2, will move up and play for the Mustangs to provide a much-needed blend of youth and experience. A special mention should go to 'Dorian Grey' skipper, Paul Massey, who has led the 3s by example over the last few seasons.

Ups & Downs: What Happened Where in Kent Rugby?

Bob Hayton's Comprehensive End-of-Season Round Up

Well, apart from our own division, a lot of rugby was played elsewhere in the county. Following a restructuring process during the closed season Blackheath competed in National Div 1 where they had a mixed season that resulted in a less than convincing mid-table position. Meanwhile Westcombe Park and Canterbury competed in the newly titled National 2 (South). Canterbury had another season that promised much but failed to really threaten the promotion places, whilst Westcombe Park, following last season's relegation, found themselves at the bottom end of the table for a long time; relegation would have been cut and dried were it not for Lydney being docked 10-points for an indiscretion during the season. But Combe's major saving was the fact that N2S went through the season with only 15 clubs due to the collapse and withdrawal of Mounts Bay just prior to the season. This meant that only two sides were relegated with three moving up from Level 5 to re-balance the division with 16 clubs for next season.

LONDON 1 (SOUTH)

Although there was no Kent based side in National 3 (SE) this season, that will not be the case next year as Gravesend built on the promise of last year to take the title in London 1 (South). Unlike last season, where Kent clubs failed to make any real impact in the promotion race, Dover, following a promising first season in this division made a sustained challenge, with Cobham and new boys Chichester also in the mix although it was a late charge from Sidcup that looked like it might deprive Dover of the play-off opportunity (away against the Civil Service from London 1N). A slow start by the Dover in the play-off gave Civil Service the advantage and despite a valiant effort by Dover in the second half they could not overhaul the opposition total and must wait another year for the prospect of promotion. Across the rest of the division it was actually quite tight and, with ten Kent clubs out of the fourteen in the division, it was felt that a number of them would be

competing for promotion. In the end it was inconsistency that prevented any other serious challenge from Kent sides. Old Elthamians really fell off the pace after a very promising opening quarter of the season and with the bottom three sides in National 3 (SE) ¹ all destined for London 1(S), their early April loss to Tunbridge Wells saw them relegated to London 2 (SE) after just one season in the division. Obviously, as a club we had a disappointing season, failing to take opportunities when they came our way, and will be playing in London 2(SE) next season. And whilst our near neighbours might feel we were lucky to have stayed up after last season, their unexpected promotion after various appeals and the idiosyncrasies of the restructuring system proved a bridge too far, even with a number of players parachuted in (both puns intended).

LONDON 2 (SOUTH EAST)

If London 1 (South) comprises mainly Kent clubs, the reverse is true of London 2 (SE) where the majority of teams are Sussex or Surrey based. However, the major power was what many have referred to as the 'semi professional Tonbridge Juddians' (after all - 'Money Talks'), who duly fulfilled the prophecy of Phil Cooper ² Folkestone's match reporter last season; with the only real question being, "Who would take the runner-up spot?" After just missing out last season, Hove looked to have the position secure by Christmas but Warlingham and a resurgent Sevenoaks, who had rediscovered their form, were very much in the mix. In the end Hove held on to take the play-off position where they defeated Guernsey 17-14 in a tight contest. At the foot of the table Old Dunstonians struggled yet again and only avoided relegation with a last minute try on the final day of the season. Eastbourne were anchored to the foot of the

table and it was newly promoted Bromley who eventually filled the other relegation place.

LONDON 3 (SOUTH EAST)

In London 3 (SE) only Charlton Park threatened the promotion positions and newly promoted Medway creditably finished comfortably in the top half of the table, but in the end it was Sussex sides Heathfield & Waldron and Brighton that took the honours with East Grinstead the nearest challengers having fallen off the pace in the second half of the season. At the bottom end of the table Whitstable and Old Gravesendians struggled while Folkestone were never really comfortable but the real losers were Park House, where a transgression resulted in a 10-point deduction in mid season took them from a respectable mid table position to the foot of the table. However, they still had enough time to pull themselves clear of the 'drop zone' and it was Hastings & Bexhill that filled the third relegation place.

KENT 1

In the County leagues, the dominant force was Dartfordians who took the Kent 1 title and appear to have 'steadied the ship' after a slide of several relegations in recent seasons, with Cranbrook as their nearest challengers taking the runner up spot for the play-off against Uckfield where they overhauled a 19-0 deficit in the last quarter to win 19-21. At the foot of the table Sheppey were anchored to the bottom for a long period but managed to haul themselves clear in the second half of the season. Guys didn't help themselves with a 16-point deduction but, like Park House in the division above, managed to recover and avoid relegation and so it is HSBC who drop to Kent 2 along with Erith, both after only one season in the division.

KENT 2

In Kent 2 Lordswood was the dominant force running out clear winners in an undefeated season, although it must be said that they were repositioned in Kent 2 following their withdrawal from the league three divisions higher. The outcome was, therefore, probably to be expected. The race for second place was between three clubs, Shooters Hill, New Ash Green and Orpington who set the early pace. In the end it went down to the last round of fixtures with NAG taking the second promotion place. Brockleians found themselves as the strongest side in Kent, holding everyone else up from the foot of the English Club Championship in Kent.

(Note: Due to the promotion of two Kent clubs to the London & SE leagues from Kent 1, as we go to press the issue of relegation/promotion between Kent 1 & 2 is not finalised. I am assuming here that it will be two-down & two-up).

CUP COMPETITIONS

Due to the restructuring of the leagues and the resultant increase in the size of some divisions at Level 3-6. This season had no National competitions for clubs at those levels, leaving only the Intermediate Cup, Senior and Junior Vases. In the Intermediate Cup only Tonbridge Juddians got beyond the second round, reaching the semi-finals nationally when they beat Hampshire club Tottonians 22-15 in the Divisional Final. The semi-final proved a game too far and they lost out 19-13 to Bristol club, Old Redcliffians. In the Senior Vase, Folkestone made it as far as the fourth round before going out to Gosport & Fareham (who made the Divisional Final), whilst in the Junior Vase Sittingbourne managed to get to the fifth round before narrowly falling to Teddington, who went on to win a close fought Divisional Final and then progress to the National Final at Twickenham.

COUNTY COMPETITIONS

In the four county competitions there were a few different clubs in the respective finals. The Kent Cup competition was not as predictable as in previous seasons with the recent change in the rules for National League clubs meaning that not all of the so-called 'big guns' got to the latter stages, and none reaching the semi-finals. The competition seemed to provide the spark that Sevenoaks needed to regain some form and consistency as they disposed of Sidcup in round1 and then Canterbury in a match played in what at times were blizzard conditions. Our own challenge ended against league rivals Gravesend, who with the 'big guns' all falling foul of junior opposition were probably left as the tournament favourites on the back of their impressive league form. In the end Blackheath's conquerors Old Colfeians fell to Gravesend in one semi final with Sevenoaks' cup run coming to an end in a narrow defeat to Old Elthamians. The Final between Gravesend and Old Elthamians ran to the form book with Gravesend capping a fine season narrowly coming out on top (23-24) despite being pushed all the way by an OEs side that showed much of its early season promise. In fact the pre-match favourites were 20-7 down at half-time.

In a Plate Competition, that seemed to spark little interest in most clubs, Canterbury would have been expected to dominate following their early exit from the Cup. With most clubs opting to scratch their fixtures, the city club found themselves away at Bromley in the semi final with Beckenham, the other big side in the semis, taking a trip to the south coast to meet Folkestone. The semi-finals ran true to form leaving the line up for the final as Canterbury against a Beckenham side keen to reclaim the trophy they won three seasons ago. In the end, following a 0-5 deficit in a low scoring first half, they proved too strong for the city club that was still fulfilling Saturday league commitments and ran out winners by 22-10.

The Vase competition also saw a number of walkovers in the first round, leaving the semi finals to read Sittingbourne v Cranbrook, in what was played as a Kent 1/Vase double-header Cranbrook came out on top and met a deceptively lowly Lordswood, the Kent 2 Champions having toppled the Kent 1 Champions, Dartfordians, in the other semi-final. The final was a tight contest with only one point the difference, the 18-17 score line going in favour of Lordswood, who had now beaten both the winners and runner-up of Kent 1 on their way to the trophy.

The Salver competition saw a resurgent Sheppey defeat Ashford in one semi-final with Anchorians winning away at Erith by 13-10. The final was keenly contested, with Sheppey eager to register their first win over Anchorians this season, eventually running out convincing winners by 32 points to 10.

On the subject of the county competitions, the topic of their continued relevance, especially at Cup level was often the subject for discussion on the touchline and in the various clubhouses. The December & January snow forced a number of postponements in the league that quickly swallowed up any spare weekends that clubs had earmarked for county competition. With the Cup, in particular, no longer offering qualification into higher-level national competition and the potential for financial reward, is the incentive to compete still there? Of course players want to do well but in the second half of the season, when injuries start to take their toll and a backlog of fixtures is created by the weather, clubs have to prioritise and two matches in two days can be a daunting task at this level. Perhaps, as was suggested by Gravesend's match reporter, we should look at going back to something like the midweek Floodlit Cup competition format that ran in the 80's in order to alleviate the weekend fixture congestion created by the inevitable annual

wet or icy weather. In fact, to their credit Gravesend placed a higher priority on the Kent Cup than the inaugural RFU League Champions Cup; in part because they could not name the required amount of front-row forwards, but also because club touring arrangements meant they would be unable to fulfil the next round anyway. At the moment they are waiting to see what sanction (if any) the RFU will come up with and it could be as bad as being docked 10 points at the start of next season's campaign in National 3 SE, unless of course there is a sudden outbreak of common sense at HQ!

In the regional Evergreen Cup competition, this season saw a different name on the trophy with Sutton & Epsom going out in the early rounds to Haywards Heath. The semi-finals saw Maidstone out muscled by Haywards Heath whilst Cranbrook travelled to Blackheath whose 'star studded' line-up was just too powerful and ran out convincing winners. The final between Blackheath and Haywards Heath saw an emphatic win for Blackheath who had too much all-round fire power for the Sussex club. In the Plate competition, TJs having failed to honour their cup fixture, also withdrew from the Plate. The Plate Final was Sevenoaks Acorns taking on Warlingham, the Acorns have been chasing silverware in this competition for quite a while and their quest came to an end with a comprehensive 34-13 victory. Since there appears to be a waiting list of clubs eager to join this competition, it poses the question as to whether teams that consistently fail to honour their fixtures should be allowed to enter next season.

JUNIOR LEAGUES

Around the Kent Junior Leagues this article will only concentrate on the Invicta & Mid-Kent Leagues as they are the ones that directly affect the club's other XVs. Of course, with this being the first season of a restructured county junior league system, the outcome of promotions and relegations along with other repositioning of teams will not become clear until well into the closed season. In the Invicta league the big battle was between TJs second XV, who were riding on the resurgence of their successful first XV, and Canterbury's Development XV with TJs just coming out on top. At the foot of Division 1 both ourselves and Old Elthamians struggled. In Division 2 the battle for the top prize was very much a three-horse race between Canterbury third XV, Old Alleynians second XV and our own third XV. In a division that very much took our thirds away from their dominant position in the

Mid-Kent leagues they performed extremely well, and will probably rue a couple of early season narrow defeats that may have cost them the title. At the foot of the table Aylesford withdrew leaving Bromley's second XV anchored to the bottom. In Division 3 the battle was between the third XVs of Thanet and Dover, the outcome being decided in Thanet's favour with a 34-7 victory over their main rivals. The foot of the table was equally close with Ash, D&B second XV, Sevenoaks third XV and Whitstable seconds all fighting to avoid the bottom position. In the end Whitstable lost out by the margin of 2-points, again on the last weekend of the season.

In the Mid-Kent Leagues our fourth XV had been elevated to Mid-Kent A and finished in lower mid table with Sevenoaks fourth XV taking the title and OGs second XV occupying the relegation spot. Mid-Kent B had no representation from the club and was won by Old Tonbridgians at something of a canter, with Cranbrook's thirds at the foot of the division. Our fifths enjoyed their best season for some time, although their league position doesn't really demonstrate the improvement they have shown. The title was won by Aylesford's fifth XV (or is that their 2nds, 3rds or 4ths) it is difficult to tell when they seldom field all their sides on any given weekend. With Anchorians third XV withdrawing from the league the bottom position was occupied by New Ash Green's thirds.

Finally, a word about the club's U17 side who continue to develop and improve and this year reached the final in the Kent Cup, losing out 17-7 to favourites Sevenoaks in a match that was far closer than the score implies and where, with the ball in hand they looked the most threatening. In fact Sevenoaks went on to defeat North Walsham 20 -11 in the London & SE Regional U17 Final of the National Competition and then Taunton 20-18 and Old Northamptonians 38-10 in the National Plate Semi-Final and Final respectively, so not a bad benchmark against which to measure the side's improvement over the last couple of seasons.

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

The County championship saw Kent competing in Division 2 on the Bill Beaumont Cup having been promoted from the Shield competition after last year's performance. The side based around the national league with a strong showing of Gravesend players swept all before them in Division 2 (South) opening their account with an impressive 55-15 win against Hampshire

at Havant. Another convincing 43-14 victory on their away trip to Taunton against Somerset set them up nicely for their only home fixture in the pool stage at Folkestone, against a Middlesex side that had won one and lost one. The match was a one sided affair with Middlesex outclassed and unable to cope with the strength of the Kent from 1-22, and in glorious weather in front of the home crowd Kent ran out easy winners 66-0. As Division 2 (South) champions and knowing they were already promoted to the Division 1 competition next season, they took on their northern counterparts Warwickshire in the Division 2 Plate Final during the bank holiday weekend at Blackheath. As expected the match was a much closer contest with Kent taking the honours and running out narrow victors by 33-27.

Stop Press (8 th June) With the fixtures for Kent 1 & 2 having now been announced it appears there has been some realignment of the

divisions required. Kent 1 will consist of 12 clubs as before with the top two from last season promoted and replaced by two clubs coming down from L3(SE). At the bottom of the table things are not as clear cut, with bottom placed Erith and 3rd bottom Guys Hospital relegated, they are replaced by the champions and runners up from Kent 2. second from bottom HSBC are spared relegation.

In Kent 2, Kings College Hospital have withdrawn from the league and have been replaced by Southwark Lancers to maintain the division at 10 clubs. The Lancers were only formed in 2008 and have moved up from the Kent Metropolitan League so 2010/11 will be only their second season of competitive league rugby.

THE LEAGUE POINTS SYSTEM

Next season could see a change to the league points scoring system with amateur rugby from Level 6 (London 1 down) adopting the same system of bonus points as the elite end of the game. Last season, as part of the RFU's Rugby Landscape initiative, bonus points were introduced in National League 3 (Level 5) on a trial basis. As we go to press the RFU is consulting all clubs in the league structure at Level 6 and below as to whether bonus points should be introduced throughout the leagues for next season, 2010 - 2011.

At the moment we don't know whether this will come into effect, or if it does, whether or not it will be adopted by the county's junior leagues. Please see the website for any updates on what decision is arrived at. *RH*

A Try From Every Position on the Pitch



Of the 22 games completed we finished our season with a record of:

Andy Ripley

The last in a great English tradition

As many of you will know Andy finally lost his five-year long battle with prostate cancer on June 17th. It was a fight he conducted in his own inimitable fashion, as he did everything from his highly successful business career, his rugby, to winning the Superstars title in 1980 and latterly as Veterans World Indoor Rowing Champion in 1992. He was at one time described as perhaps the last in a great English tradition of all-round amateur sportsmen going back to CB Fry.


Andrew George Ripley was born in 1947 and he played rugby for Rosslyn Park (his only club), the Barbarians, England and the Lions. I well remember his international debut against Wales in 1972, a time when English rugby was pretty diabolical despite the existence of some darn good players (sound familiar?). On he came ball in hand, crashing into contact and then, just as emphatically, bursting through the other side, long hair streaming out behind him and leaving a clutch of dazed and confused Welshmen in his wake and, boy, could he run!

He rapidly became one of the best Number 8s of his day, certainly the most awkward. His direct approach at a time when I, at the ripe old age of 26, was converting from a centre to a back row, was an object lesson in how to play the game from the back of the scrum.

Those familiar with Paul Kimmage's piece in the Sunday Times of 23rd May this year will also know of the circumstances that, physically at least, reduced Andy to a mere shadow of the guy he was in his pomp. The sight of him receiving his OBE from HRH The Prince of Wales in May, blind and confined to a wheel chair following the return of the cancer in 2008, was a severe shock.

It is hard to see your heroes cut down so cruelly until, that is, you realise that despite outward appearances, the hero that you created in your mind, is still there, still the same guy and still heroic

right up to the end. Indeed he would probably have argued that he was that way because of his circumstances. Besides, what makes guys like Andy Ripley the way they are is not just their physical presence, although in rugby that can be an advantage, no, it is what goes on in their hearts and heads. Cancer cannot change that.

Since Ripley's day there have been many outstanding Number 8s and I'm sure there were before him, but I have to think hard about that because, for me, he totally eclipsed what came before him. He is the archetype on whom all my subsequent judgements are based and he will always remain that despite his premature departure from this life. **DW**

By the start of the season the under 16s numbers had swelled and despite some notable departures we had 25 boys regularly attending training; a step in the right direction.

Our two opening games against Anchorians and Gravesend were, as expected, very positive but there then followed two narrow defeats by teams we could have beaten (Bromley and Old Colfeans) and then a heavier defeat at the hands of an organised and disciplined Sittingbourne team. Blackheath were, therefore, approached with some caution and although we lost it was, by all accounts, a stronger performance – I cannot tell you as, within five minutes of the kick-off on their all-weather pitch, I was in an ambulance accompanying a 'major' head injury to hospital, only for him to be discharged four hours later with a packet of Paracetamol, still, better safe than sorry.

Next up were Sidcup, who we were beating easily, when indiscipline by many parties caused the game to be cut short (nobody's finest hour). The next weekend we allowed this indiscipline to reappear and lost to an Old Elthamians team we should have run rings around (the biggest disappointment of the season). Our next game, against Old Gravesendians was a victory, although the performance was still not wholly impressive. And so it was, with a great deal trepidation, that we prepared for the visit of Tonbridge Juddians. Without doubt this was our best performance of the season, losing narrowly by two tries to one whereas in each of the previous three years we have lost 50+ to Nil in games which finished early. Then it snowed and snowed and rugby took a winter break. At the end of January we did

squeeze on to the pitch for a game against Tunbridge Wells which resulted in a loss. Then, on the following Sunday, an early morning drive half-way to Thanet, only for the game to be cancelled, meant that, by now, everybody was beginning to lose their sense of humour. The season then began to get back on track with a draw against Beckenham and a victory against Ashford before the arrival of Medway. They beat us with a last-minute converted try after another committed and competitive performance.

There was a party atmosphere for our Friday night fixture under the floodlights at Aylesford. The Facebook effect meant that the game was played in front of over 200 parents, school friends and hangers-on etc. It was a great experience and a very enjoyable game, not least because we:

Won, Were always in control, Played great attacking rugby and... Were even responsible for their try.

The Kent prelims saw some up-and-down performances. As usual the better the opposition the better we played. We almost caused a shock against Canterbury who only beat us by a point with a 'last kick of the game' penalty, but we struggled to defeat Sidcup and lost again to Tunbridge Wells in the first knock-out game. Two more strong performances followed beating Whitstable by seven tries to none in a hard fought and surprisingly close game, given the score line, then victory against a (weakened) Westcombe Park, much to their surprise.

Next we toured Norfolk and played in the East Coast Festival of Rugby hosted by Norwich RFU. In glorious April sunshine we played teams from Windsor, Sheffield, Leamington Spa, Biggleswade and Bromley producing varied performances (Won 2, Drawn 1, Lost 3) finishing seventh out of 10 teams. The highlight was a strong forwards game in defeat against the eventual winners Sheffield.

Following the games, awards for the tournament and the season were given out.

- Dan Eastwood was awarded 'Player of the Tournament', well deserved as Dan scored several outstanding tries, made numerous tackles and generally worked his socks off throughout the tournament.
- Chris Skinner received the ignominious award of 'Player Who Should Have Stayed Home' but through no fault of his own, as he was concussed in the first game against Windsor and unable to play thereafter.

- Danny Walsh was voted our 'Most Improved Player', another very well deserved accolade as Danny has become a much better and fitter prop this season.
- Our 'Player of the Season' was Dualtagh Franklin a well-earned reward for a season of consistent rugby of the highest quality.
- Lewis "Forrest" Fagg received both the Best New Player and the Players Player award, a great achievement in his first year of Rugby.

The final game of the season saw us entertaining the touring Old Oakmedians from Bournemouth. It was an enjoyable afternoon and a very close game which we managed to lose 22 – 21.

This season has seen the 16s make considerable progress, bolstered by a much stronger squad than we have had in previous years, and we are now competing at a higher level and doing so with a greater degree of consistency than we have seen before. We still lose too many matches after we have worked ourselves into a winning position and there is still room for improvement across all areas of the team. I mentioned earlier in this piece about Richard Ewence's Weekly Round-Up being viewed across the globe. - Of those hits, over 53% were referrals from search engines with 34% being direct traffic and the remainder being referrals from other sites.
- 30% of hits are new viewers.
- It is viewed in many different countries on all continents, apart from all of the European & Scandinavian countries plus the big three SH countries, these include Argentina, China, Columbia, Japan, India, Oman, Thailand, UAE, Libya, and The Phillipines
- Most viewers are on the website for at least 2.5 minutes.
- The most viewed pages are: Senior Fixtures (Results & Match Reports) Weekly Round Up Club News Team Selection Youth Rugby

Touchline Newsletter

As was mentioned in the last edition of the newsletter, this was intended to be the final edition in a printed format. The plan was that, from next season, the newsletter would be a solely on line publication which could be downloaded and read with Adobe Acrobat Reader.

Additionally, there is the possibility of more frequent or event specifically orientated editions, although we will have to look closely at how this dovetails with the content on the club's website.

Obviously the switch to an online publication is the next evolution in the club's newsletter and we will monitor the way in which that develops. As the reader your feedback is vital and will be appreciated.

The main thing to bear in mind is that, whatever the outcome of the transition, the newsletter is always reliant upon contributions from the membership. It is particularly gratifying that for this edition we seem to have captured very nearly a full set from across the club (shame about the Tag Rugby contribution - Ed.), because without content it says nothing.

Finally, the club would like to thank Dave Wetjen who, although his son Tim is departing to university, has kindly agreed to maintain his contribution to the club and continue to assemble and edit the newsletter. He has been key to its continued development and improvement as a means of keeping the membership informed. *RH*
